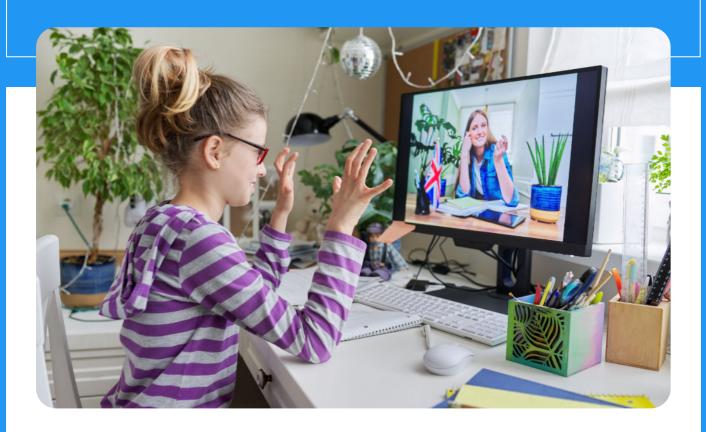


INDEFINITE ASPECT


