It always indicates the noun performing the action or being in a state or condition in English nominative case, which is also marked by a subjective pronoun like I. We, he, she, we, you, and they. When a noun is used as the subject of a verb, it is called the nominative case. For example, "Nia ate an apple." Here, ' Nia" is the subject acting,
