

FIRST PERSON

What is the first person? If you are a speaker or writer referring to yourself or a group that includes yourself, then you are speaking or writing in the first person. It is used when you are intimately familiar with the action, experience, or observation being described. The first person pronouns are “I” (single) and “we” (plural). Writing in the first person allows you to communicate with the reader about their own thoughts, feelings, and experiences.
