


HOMOGRAPH

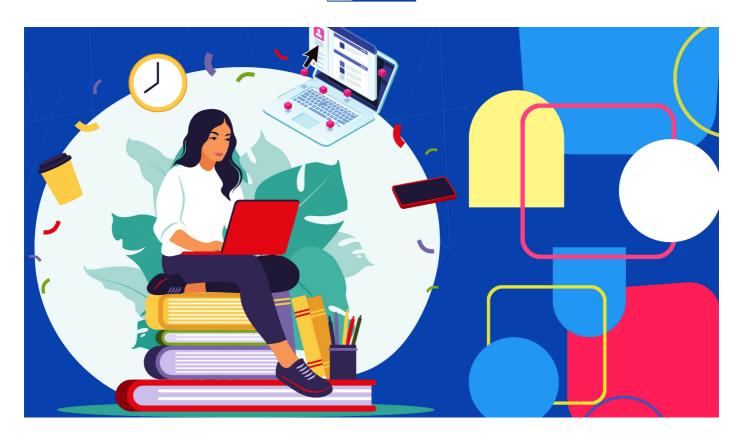
